EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Following each decennial federal census, the County is required to adjust its supervisorial district boundaries to ensure Board member districts comply with specified demographic and population requirements, and that each elected official represents approximately the same number of constituents. To promote and advance the 2021 redistricting efforts in Tulare County, on May 12, 2020, the Board of Supervisors established the 2021 Advisory Commission on Supervisorial Redistricting, and on May 11, 2021, appointed eleven Commissioners – two from each supervisorial district and one member at-large.

The Commission's primary role was to determine the need for supervisorial district boundary changes, solicit public outreach regarding possible changes, and recommended maps to the Board of Supervisors that incorporate public input while adhering to federal and state mandated redistricting criteria. The Commission completed its business in five months, from May 20, 2021 through October 21, 2021, during which time it held 14 public meetings in each county district (33 hours in total), attended by more than 250 community members in-person, more than 50 community member via Zoom, and several more listeners via live stream on YouTube. In total, 26 unique agencies and organizations were represented at these meetings and the many hours of recorded public comment served to inform and develop the Commission's final recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

The County contracted with Lali Moheno & Associates for community outreach services, which included the creation and distribution of flyers, press releases, videos, and social media posts. Cities, service clubs, political clubs, and various individuals were contacted directly by phone, email and/or in person and encouraged to attend and participate in Commission meetings. This extensive and ongoing community outreach effort, including the efforts of the Commission, should be credited for the quantity of maps submitted by community members and for the substantial attendance and involvement at each Commission meeting.

In total, the Commission reviewed 24 community maps and 13 Commission maps. Each map was evaluated for compliance with the redistricting criteria established by the California Fair Maps Act, and consideration of communities of interest identified by the public. Prominent communities of interest identified through exhaustive public comment included the desire to create a single mountain district, to keep West Goshen and Woodlake in District 4, to keep Tule River Tribal lands in a single district, to keep Strathmore, Lindsay, and Farmersville in a single district, and to create at least three Hispanic Citizen Voting Age (H-CVAP) majority districts, and to maintain as many communities whole as possible.

Ultimately, the Commission found that the following maps represented well the map elements required by the California Fair Maps Act, those requested by the public throughout this process, and the interests of Tulare County.

- 1. COM-001b Equity Coalition Map, submitted by the Equitable Map Coalition on September 30, 2021. Findings in support of this map are included in Section 6 of this report and a full-page map may be found in Appendix A.
- 2. **COM-002a1 Wells Map**, submitted by Korey Wells on October 14, 2021. Findings in support of this map are included in Section 6 of this report and a full-page map may be found in Appendix B.
- **3. COM-003a Verduzco Map**, submitted by Jose Verduzco on October 14, 2021. Findings in support of this map are included in Section 6 of this report and a full-page map may be found in Appendix C.
- **4. COM-005b Kindschuh Map**, submitted by Steve Kindschuh on October 17, 2021. Findings in support of this map are included in Section 6 of this report and a full-page map may be found in Appendix D.

I. INTRODUCTION & BACKGROUND

Redistricting Overview

In accordance with Elections Code §21500, following each decennial federal census, the County is required to adjust its supervisorial district boundaries to ensure districts are substantially equal in population and comply with specific federal and state demographic and geographic requirements. This process is called redistricting and is important in ensuring that each elected official represents approximately the same number of constituents. At the county level, redistricting determines which neighborhoods and communities are grouped together into a supervisorial district for purposes of electing a representative on the Board of Supervisors.

In Tulare County, the Board of Supervisors is responsible for drawing supervisorial districts. In 2021, consistent with past practice in 2011, the Board appointed an advisory commission to seek public input in determining boundary changes for supervisorial districts – the 2021 Advisory Commission on Supervisorial Redistricting (Commission). Specifically, the Commission was tasked with evaluating state and federally mandated redistricting criteria to determine the need for additional local criteria; using said criteria to determine the need for boundary changes in Tulare County; soliciting public testimony regarding community interests and their impact on boundary changes; and recommending three draft maps to the Board of Supervisors for consideration. Ultimately the Commission voted to recommend four maps to the Board of Supervisors, detailed further in Section 6 of this report.

California Fair Maps Act 2019

Prior to the start of the 2021 redistricting process, in October 2019, the State of California made significant statutory reforms to the county redistricting process through the Fair Maps Act (AB 849). The most notable of these reforms include the specification of eight prioritized criteria, and required methods of public engagement through public hearings, public outreach, and online recordkeeping.

- 1. Redistricting Criteria. The following criteria are required by the Fair Maps Act to be applied in priority order:
 - 1. **Population Equality**. Population equality shall be based on the total population of residents of the county as determined by the decennial census. State prisoners, whose last known place of residence was in Tulare County as determined by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, shall be added to the Tulare County population.
 - 2. **Legal Compliance**. Supervisorial district boundaries shall comply with the U.S. Constitution, California Constitution, and the federal Voting Rights Act.
 - 3. **Contiguous**. To the extent practicable, Districts shall be geographically contiguous.
 - 4. **Community Integrity**. To the extent practicable, Districts shall respect the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest in a manner that minimizes its division.
 - 5. **City and CDP Integrity**. To the extent practicable, Districts shall respect the geographic integrity of a city or census designated place in a manner that minimizes its division
 - 6. **Identifiable Boundaries**. District boundaries should be easily identifiable and understandable by residents. To the extent practicable, Districts shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by streets, or by boundaries of the county.

- 7. **Compactness**. To the extent practicable, and where it does not conflict with the preceding criteria, Districts shall be drawn to encourage geographic compactness in such a manner that nearby areas of population are not bypassed in favor of more distant populations.
- 8. **No Political Parties**. The board shall not adopt boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party.

In accordance with the duties outlined in its Bylaws, the Commission considered the need for local redistricting criteria, to be considered in addition to, and in lower priority order than the eight criteria established by the Fair Maps Act. At the August 12, 2021 Commission meeting, the Commission voted to recommend that the Board of Supervisors adopt no additional criteria in the 2021 redistricting process. During their discussion, Commissioners noted that the existing criteria provide an adequate framework for considering all comments and concerns raised by the public. On August 24, 2021, the Board of Supervisors adopted the recommendation.

- 2. Public Hearings. The County is required to engage the public in redistricting by holding a minimum of four public hearings, one of which must occur prior to drafting an initial map, at least two of which must occur after a map has been drafted, and one of which can be delegated to staff or an advisory commission.
 - On September 9, 2021, the Commission held the County's first redistricting public hearing before it drafted its first map. The meeting was held in the Board of Supervisors Chambers at 6:30 p.m., during which time staff presented the unadjusted 2020 Census Data in the 2011 district boundaries, and the Commission heard public testimony regarding the composition of one or more supervisorial districts.
 - On October 26, 2021, the Board of Supervisors will hold the County's second redistricting public hearing at 9:00 a.m. in the Board of Supervisors Chambers.
 - On November 2, 2021, the Board of Supervisors will hold the County's third redistricting public hearing at 6:30 p.m. in the Board of Supervisors Chambers.
 - On November 9, 2021, the Board of Supervisors will hold the County's fourth redistricting public hearing at 9:00 a.m. in the Board of Supervisors Chambers.
- 3. Public Outreach. To further engage the public, the County is required to conduct specific outreach regarding the redistricting process through media organizations and community groups that serve and are active in language minority communities. Additionally, draft maps with detailed demographic information must be published on the internet for seven days prior to adoption, during which time the public will be allowed to provide testimony.

To ensure that the public outreach requirements of the Fair Maps Act were met, the County contracted with Lali Moheno & Associates to engage the public in the redistricting process. Further detail regarding these efforts may be found in Section 2 of this report, Public Outreach.

4. Recordkeeping. To facilitate the dissemination of information and retain a record of the redistricting process, the County is required to establish and maintain a redistricting website for at least 10 years after the adoption of new district boundaries. Specific content requirements for the website are detailed in CA Elections Code §21508, subdivision (g). The County established a redistricting website in January 2021. Further detail regarding this site and its contents may be found in Section 2 of this report, Public Outreach.

2. PUBLIC OUTREACH

In May 2021, the County contracted **Lali Moheno & Associates (Outreach Consultants)** to provide community outreach services throughout the redistricting process. The purpose of this partnership was to encourage residents, including those in underrepresented communities and non-English speaking communities, to participate in the redistricting public review process. Over the following five months, the Outreach Consultants provided redistricting information to English and Spanish-language media organizations, community groups, and individuals throughout Tulare County. It was frequently noted that Tulare County had devised the most inclusive and informative outreach process among its peers. This team also provided valuable insight into the barriers to civic participation experienced by various communities in the County, and coordinated with County staff to identify meeting venues and locations that ensure all County stakeholders have an opportunity to learn how districts are drawn and were able to access the Commission to voice their opinion. To this end, a good faith effort to reach and engage community members was undertaken.

The public engagement strategies utilized by the Outreach Consultants, were dynamic and responsive to changing community, Commission, and County needs. Recommendations from the community, County staff, and Commissioners were incorporated to improve outreach and community input and updates were provided to County staff and the Commission at every staff meeting and Commission meeting.

The COVID-19 pandemic posed specific challenges to effective public outreach primarily at the start of the project, when social distancing mandates were relaxed, and cases started to subside. Residents who were hesitant about attending in-person meetings, were encouraged to participate online, and the County made every effort to accommodate participation on Zoom and via telephone.

Meeting Times & Locations. Moheno & Associates and County staff planned meeting schedules, and researched locations. Thereafter, meeting places were chosen, negotiated, and contracted. To optimize access and participation, two rounds of meetings were scheduled in cities and rural communities of each of the five supervisorial districts. The first series of meetings were informational listening sessions focused on explaining the process, Fair Maps Act & Voting Rights Act requirements, guidelines, timelines and soliciting community input. The second series were working meetings where community and Commission maps were presented and discussed. During the final working meetings, the Commissioners broke into small work groups to focus on a select number of maps, after which they presented those maps to their fellow Commissioners. All Commission meetings were held at a consistent date and time - Thursday evening at 6:30 p.m.

Media Outreach. The redistricting process was publicized through local media and social media outlets (online, television, print, radio). Print media created in support of this effort have been included in **Appendix E**.

- Flyers. Flyers were created to announce individual meetings for the series of informational listening sessions, working meetings, and mandatory public hearings conducted both by the Commission and the Board of Supervisors. These flyers were posted on the redistricting website, emailed to Commissioners and community leaders for distribution, and printed and made available to the public at each Commission meeting.
- Press Releases. Press releases were coordinated through County staff and sent directly from the County Public Information Officer.

- Videos. Two informational videos were created in English and Spanish in collaboration with the County
 HHSA Communications Team. Videos were posted on redistricting website homepage, were distributed
 electronically to community organizations, service agencies, and shared on social media sites. Videos may

- **Spanish-Language Media**. Redistricting information was provided through several Spanish-language media outlets including Radio Bilingüe, and Vida en El Valle, a Bilingual Newspaper.

Translation Services. Linguistica Translation Services was contracted to conduct live translation of Commission meetings in Spanish and other languages, as requested. New translation equipment was purchased to ensure effective translation services for in-person participants as well as those joining remotely. Two translators were utilized during meetings to accommodate the use of a separate Spanish language translation services over Zoom for anyone attending in person, and face-to-face translation for the Commission to receive public comment from Spanish-speaking members of the community.

Local Agencies & Community Organizations. The Outreach Consultants contacted cities, service clubs, political clubs and other community organizations directly by phone, email, or in person to share redistricting information and invite members to participate in Commission meetings. When possible, in-person visits were made to city council, school boards, service clubs, and the Tule River Tribal Council meetings.

Community leaders, teachers, school administrators, elected officials, business owners, and other individuals were sent flyers, emails, and video links. The Outreach Consultants maintained contact with multiple organizations and individuals throughout the various stages of the process to provide updates and garner interest. A comprehensive list of local agencies and organizations engaged during this process may be found in **Appendix F**.

Redistricting Website. In accordance with the California Fair Maps Act, the County established a redistricting website (https://tularecounty.ca.gov/redistricting/), which includes the following information in English and Spanish:

- 1. A general explanation of the redistricting process for Tulare County.
- 2. The procedures for a member of the public to testify during a public hearing or to submit written testimony directly to the Commission and Board of Supervisors.
- 3. A calendar of all public meetings, hearings, and workshop dates, times, and locations.
- 4. The notice and agenda for each public meeting, hearing, and workshop.
- 5. The audio or audiovisual recording and adopted minutes of each public meeting, hearing, and workshop.
- 6. Each draft map considered by the Commission and Board of Supervisors at a public meeting, hearing, and workshop.

The site will also include the adopted final map of supervisorial district boundaries and will be maintained as a record of this process for the following ten years.

3. ADVISORY COMMISSION

As noted previously, in May 2020, the Board of Supervisors established the Commission to conduct public outreach regarding the redistricting process, determine the necessity of boundary changes in Tulare County, and incorporate public testimony into multiple draft maps for consideration by the Board of Supervisors. Fifty-one (51) qualified applications for the Commission were received by the County from January 12 through April 30, 2021. It is noted that in March 2021, the Board extended the application period by an additional month to encourage the submittal of more applications and broader community participation. As a result, each supervisorial district had at least five candidates from which to appoint.

On May 11, 2021, the Board appointed eleven Commissioners – two from each supervisorial district and one member at-large. Appointments were made in accordance with the Commission Bylaws, as follows:

- 1. Each member of the Board made one direct appointment from among the qualified applicants who were determined by the Registrar of Voters to reside in and be registered to vote in his or her district.
- 2. Each member of the Board then made one indirect appointment from among the remaining qualified applicants from his or her district by selecting the name of the applicant randomly out of a hat.
- 3. Finally, the names of the remaining qualified applicants were placed in a hat and one name was drawn by the Chief Clerk of the Board, which then became the eleventh at-large member of the Commission.

Commission Meetings

The Commission held seven informational public meetings in Visalia, Exeter, Tulare, Dinuba, and Porterville prior to the release of 2020 redistricting data by the United States Census Bureau. At these meetings, Commissioners and staff presented information regarding the redistricting process in Tulare County, answered questions submitted by the public, and received public comment regarding communities of interest, and additional redistricting criteria.

After the preliminary 2020 Census Data was released in August 2021, the Commission conducted another seven public working meetings in Lindsay, Earlimart, Visalia, Woodlake, and Porterville, in which the commission and the community viewed the 2020 Census data in the current supervisorial districts, determined that boundary changes were necessary, and drafted community and Commission maps for Board consideration. In total, 34 hours were dedicated by Commissioners to 14 meetings held in every district of the County. Commission meeting agendas, minutes, and presentations may be found in **Appendix G** of this report.

Community members were encouraged to participate in Commission meetings by attending in person, via Zoom, or listening to the live stream on You Tube. Meeting materials, including the Commission agendas, presentations, informational handouts, and map analyses, were made available to the public in printed form at the meeting and on the Redistricting website in English and Spanish. The flyer provided to the public outlining meeting participation methods may be found in **Appendix H** of this report.

Public comments at Commission meetings could be made in person, via Zoom, or in writing. All public comment may be accessed in the meeting recordings available on the Tulare County Redistricting website (https://tularecounty.ca.gov/redistricting).

2020 Census Data

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and challenges in completing the decennial census, the delivery of 2020 Census Data for redistricting was delayed by nearly five months, from its traditional release date of April 1. After preliminary data was released to states in August 2021, the County waited an additional month for the final data, which was adjusted by the State of California to reallocate the inmate population to the last County of residence and released through the Statewide Database on September 22, 2021. In accordance with the Fair Maps Act, the Commission waited one week after the release of the final data before drafting its first map. The first map, therefore, was drafted immediately after September 29, 2021. Pursuant to California statute, the County must complete its redistricting process by December 15, 2021. This gave the County 77 days to draft, present, modify, and approve a final map of supervisorial boundaries.

2020 Census Data shows that the population of Tulare County grew by 7% over the past ten years, from 442,179 in 2010 to 473,117 in 2020. A summary comparison of relevant 2010 and 2020 Census Data by race and ethnicity is provided in the table below:

Voting Rights Act

Notably, in the 2020 Census Data, residents who identify as of Hispanic or Latino origin comprise 65.5% of the County population - the second highest Hispanic or Latino population percentage in California, surpassed only by Imperial County with 85.2%. In accordance with redistricting criteria number two, the Commission engaged in extensive discussion regarding the federal Voting Rights Act protections provided to the Hispanic or Latino population in Tulare County due to that population's size and electoral influence. Specific protections include the requirement that district lines are 1) drawn in a manner as to avoid minimizing Hispanic or Latino electoral influence, thereby depriving that federally protected community of its ability to affect the outcome of a supervisorial election, and 2) create effective districts in which this minority community has an opportunity to nominate and elect candidates of their choice. For the purposes of evaluating compliance with the federal Voting Rights Act, the Commission utilized citizen voting age population (CVAP) data, and more narrowly Hispanic or Latino CVAP (H-CVAP) as the primary measure of district effectiveness throughout the redistricting process.

The Commission received extensive instruction as to the value of this data and the rights afforded this community via federal and State legislation. At every information meeting, the Commission reviewed Voting Rights Act requirements and each map created and reviewed during the working meetings included the H-CVAP data for each proposed supervisorial district. The Commission was requested to ensure that any map forwarded for consideration include at least two districts with a minimum of 55% H-CVAP.

Communities of Interest

In accordance with redistricting criteria number four, the Commission also solicited public testimony regarding communities of interest. The State constitution defines a community of interest as a contiguous population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. In the case of Tulare County, the Commission encouraged the public to describe how the shared interest of their identified community fell within the policy jurisdiction of the County. The following communities of interest identified by the public were considered in the analysis of each draft community and commission map:

- 1. Terra Bella and Ducor together with City of Porterville
- 2. West Goshen in District 4
- 3. Woodlake in District 4
- 4. Foothill-Mountain community in one district
- 5. Tulare and Visalia in one district
- 6. Tule River Tribe lands in one district
- 7. Porterville in District 5
- 8. Split Visalia between no more than two districts
- 9. Strathmore, Lindsay, and Farmersville together in one district

Need for Boundary Changes

To determine the need for supervisorial district boundary changes, the Commission analyzed the compliance of 2020 Census Data in currently drawn districts against the mandated redistricting criteria. The following is a summary of that analysis.

On September 9, 2021, after reviewing and discussing the data in relation to the criteria put forth by the Fair Maps Act, the Commission determined that there is a need to adjust supervisorial district boundaries in Tulare County. Findings in support of this determination included the following:

- A population deviation of 6.51%, which, while within the statutory threshold of 10%, is significantly higher than the original deviation of 2.61% in 2011.
- Hispanic Citizen Voting Age (H-CVAP) of 64.7% in District 4, is 5% higher than in 2011 and may indicate lost electoral influence for the Hispanic community in that district.
- District 2 (55.2), District 1 (48.4%), and District 5 (49.4%) present an opportunity for a second and possibly third strong H-CVAP majority district at or above 55%.
- The Foothill-Mountain community of interest, which has received support from several residents to be maintained in one or two districts, is currently divided into three districts.

Given this finding, the Commission proceeded to receive and analyze community and Commission maps to recommend to the Board of Supervisors boundary changes that meet statutory criteria and incorporate community interests.

4. COMMUNITY MAPS

Community members were encouraged to submit map proposals for Commission consideration via the Tulare County Redistricting software, in writing, or in person at a Commission meeting during the prescribed period for "Community Map Presentations." Proposals made in person were allotted 15 minutes for presentation and additional time as necessary to answer questions from the Commission and the public. The flyer provided to the public that details map submission and review guidelines may be found in **Appendix I** of this report.


Staff conducted an analysis of each map submitted by the community. Maps submitted by the Tuesday before a Commission meeting or during the "Community Map Presentations" period of a Commission meeting were placed on the next Commission agenda for consideration. Mapmakers were notified of the Commission meeting in which their map was considered and invited to present on that date.

In total, the Commission considered the **24 community-proposed maps** (listed in the table below) submitted by 10 different individuals and one community coalition. This following section includes a visual representation of each community map, the associated demographic data, staff's analysis of the map's compliance with the eight redistricting criteria, and any Commission comments. A summary of all maps considered by the Commission may be found in **Appendix J**.



Commission Comments



Commission Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to be that the map created a mega mountain community, for which the Commission received significant support, and that the map had been created with community input. Concerns included splitting the City of Tulare, while the City of Porterville, with roughly the same population, remained intact. Commissioners did not find splitting Tulare was necessary for the purposes of maintaining population equality. Concerns were also raised regarding the District 5 boundary lines surrounding Porterville not taking into consideration growth areas, and that the City of Exeter was in a separate district from its wastewater treatment plant. Before the Commission had an opportunity to vote on this map, the Equitable Map Coalition submitted a second revision on September 30, 2021 (COM-001b), intended to supersede COM-001a.

COM-001B Equity Coalition Map

On September 30, 2021, the Equitable Map Coalition submitted another revision to its map, COM-001A Equity Coalition Map, for Commission consideration. Primary revisions included incorporating the entire City of Exeter into District 5. This map also included final State-adjusted 2020 Census Data. On October 7, 2021, staff presented an analysis of the map's compliance with the eight redistricting criteria.


Commission Comments

On September 30, 2021, the Commission voted to recommend the final Equity Coalition Map (COM-001B) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration. At the following meeting, on October 7, 2021, the Commission voted to make the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map is in compliance with three districts of H-CVAP majority;
- 2. Takes into consideration the community input that the Commission received regarding the single mountain district;
- 3. Splits the City of Tulare into two different districts, which, while not the preference of all Commissioners, reflects the voices we heard in the community and provides a diversity in maps recommended to the Board of Supervisors;
- 4. Fair distribution of population, to date had the most impressive population deviation;
- 5. Strongest number for H-CVAP majorities through the districts;
- 6. Most inclusive support by community members and most significant public turnout at meetings; and
- 7. Terra Bella, Ducor, and Poplar communities have more in common with City of Porterville than City of Tulare with specific regard to where individuals go to school and shop.

COM-002 Wells Map

On September 23, 2021, community member Korey Wells submitted COM-002 for Commission consideration. The map was presented by Wells at the September 23 meeting. On September 30, 2021, staff presented an analysis of the map's compliance with the eight redistricting criteria.



Commission Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to be that the boundary lines were squared off as much as possible, and that the population deviation was very low. Concerns included that the mountain communities were split into two districts, and that there was a lack of community input utilized in the creation of the map. The primary flaw identified was that Woodlake was not in District 4, as several members of the community had requested. On October 14, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.


Commission Comments

On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted to recommend the revised Wells Map (COM-002a1) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration, and made the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map includes three H-CVAP majority districts over 51%;
- 2. There is very low population deviation;
- 3. Meets all criteria for community integrity, including that Tulare is not split, West Goshen is in District 4, Terra Bella and Ducor are with Porterville, Woodlake is in District 4, and the middle of Visalia is kept intact;
- 4. Gives the Board a two-mountain-district option; and
- 5. The map shows the best compactness.

COM-002a2 Wells Map

On October 14, 2021, community member Korey Wells submitted COM-002a1 for Commission consideration. The map was presented by Wells at the October 14 meeting. After comment from the Commission and the public regarding keeping Woodlake in District 4, Mr. Wells decided to withdraw this map from further Commission consideration. Therefore, there is no staff analysis of this map.





Commission Comments

The Commission found merits of this map to include creating three strong H-CVAP majority districts without splitting communities other than Visalia. Concerns included the closeness to which District 4 boundary lines surrounded Woodlake, and the "flip-flopping" of neighborhoods in north Visalia that would put different city blocks into different districts. On October 14, 2021, Commissioner Verduzco requested that staff address the District 4 boundary around Woodlake a bring a revised map (COM-003a) to the final meeting.


Commission Comments

Commission Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to include that it has clean boundary lines and its three mountain districts gave perspective to the mountain community conversation. Concerns included no third majority H-CVAP district and a high population deviation. The Commissioners were split on the opinion that the map is similar to the current Board of Supervisor map. On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.

5. COMMISSION MAPS

On September 23, 2021, the Commission held a map building activity in which each Commissioner identified five to ten geographic or demographic elements that he or she would like to see incorporated into a draft Commission map. Element descriptions could be broad or specific, but were all related to at least one of the eight redistricting criteria.

As Commissioners described elements, staff listed each one on a white board for consideration. Then the Commission uses the listed elements to build five draft maps and voted to direct staff to draft the five maps for consideration at the next meeting.

At the following meetings, staff presented the draft maps to Commissioners with an analysis of each map's compliance with the eight redistricting criteria. After staff presentations, the Commissioners formed workgroups to identify elements to keep, modify, and eliminate in each map. At the end of each workshop, the commission provided direction to staff on each map to:


- 1. Move the map forward without changes for consideration at the next meeting;
- 2. Move the map forward with modifications for consideration at the next meeting; or
- 3. Eliminate the map from further consideration.

In total, the Commission considered the **13 Commission maps** listed in the table below. This following section includes a visual representation of each Commission map, the associated demographic data, staff's analysis of the map's compliance with the eight redistricting criteria, and any Commission comments. A summary of all maps considered by the Commission may be found in **Appendix J**.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to be that it creates a single mountain district, does not split the city of Tulare, and provides three strong H-CVAP majority districts. Concerns included that the map splits Woodlake into two district and splits Poplar into two districts. One commissioner did not like the Visalia Oval neighborhood placement in District 3 and felt the neighborhood would be fit better into District 4 because of its shared community interests. One commissioner noted the map does not have four H-CVAP majority districts. One Commissioner stated a desire to keep rural farm worker communities together and not divided. One Commissioner stated the northeast side of Tulare share a community interest with Southern Visalia, which is not reflected in this map. On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to modify the map to make the communities of Poplar and Woodlake whole.

ARC-001A

On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to modify ARC-001 to keep the communities of Woodlake and Poplar whole. On October 7, 2021, staff presented ARC-001A and the Commission voted to move the map forward with no additional modifications for consideration at the next meeting. On October 14, 2021, the Commission directed staff to eliminate the map from further consideration.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to be that it captures all important elements of the Equity Coalition Map except for the division of the City of Tulare. The map includes three Hispanic CVAP Districts, the mountains are a single district, the City of Tulare is kept whole, Terra Bella and Ducor is together with Porterville, and West Goshen is in District 4. Concerns were that Strathmore is not together with Portville but with Exeter and that Woodlake is in District 1. On October 7, 2021, the Commission voted to move the map forward to the next meeting for consideration. On October 14, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration, citing Woodlake not being in District 4 as the primary reason.

ARC-002

On September 23, 2021, the Commission directed staff to prepare a second commission map that incorporated the following elements: four majority H-CVAP districts; mountains in one district; keep communities of interest intact; Tribal lands in one district; and Porterville in one district. On September 30, 2021, staff presented ARC-002, and the Commission directed staff to make further modifications detailed in the following ARC-002A section of this report.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to be that it keeps West Goshen in District 4. One Commissioner noted that the map does not have four H-CVAP majority districts. On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to include two H-CVAP majority districts but not a third above 55%, a single mountain district, the City of Tulare is kept whole, Terra Bella and Ducor are together with Porterville, West Goshen is in District 4, and Woodlake is in District 4. Concerns were that Strathmore is not together with Portville but with Exeter. On October 7 and October 14, 2021, the Commission voted to move the map forward to the next meeting for consideration. On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration, citing the population deviation as higher and that the H-CVAP numbers lower than other considered maps as the primary reasons.

ARC-003



Commissioner Comments

The Commission did not identify specific merits of this map. Concerns included that the map splits the communities of Tipton, Poplar, and Richgrove into two districts each. They noted the contiguity issues with a section of District 2 inside of District 5. One Commissioner noted the map does not have the four requested H-CVAP majority districts, but has three, with a fourth close at 49.7%. Another stated the northeast side of Tulare shares a community of interest with Southern Visalia and that this map does not reflect that interest. On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to correct the contiguity issue and modify the map to make the communities of Tipton, Poplar and, Richgrove whole.

ARC-003A

On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to modify ARC-003 to maintain the contiguity of District 2, and to keep the communities of Tipton, Poplar, and Richgrove whole. On October 7, 2021, staff presented ARC-003A and the Commission directed staff to make further modifications detailed in the following ARC-003B1 and ARC-003B2 sections of this report.

Commissioner Comments

The Commission found no merits to this map. Concerns included that the map contains three mountain communities and separates the Tule River Tribal lands and the City of Porterville from the neighboring mountain community in District 1. One Commissioner stated the northeast side of Tulare share a community of interest with Southern Visalia and that this map does not reflect that interest. On September 30, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.

ARC-005

On September 23, 2021, the Commission directed staff to prepare a fifth commission map without specific parameters. On September 30, 2021, staff presented ARC-005, and the Commission directed staff to make further modifications detailed in the following ARC-005A section of this report.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to include two districts that exceed 60% H-CVAP and a third that exceeds 55%, and that it creates a single mountain district while keeping the City of Tulare whole. Concerns were that Terra Bella and Ducor are not grouped with Porterville in the same district as requested by the public. One Commissioner noted that traditionally Tipton and Pixley are included in District 2. The Commission found the map includes Tipton in both Districts 1 and 2 with Pixley located in District 2. One Commissioner stated the northeast side of Tulare shares a community of interest with Southern Visalia and that this map does not reflect that interest. The Commission voted to direct staff to incorporate the communities of Ducor and Terra Bella into District 5 and keep whole Tipton.

ARC-005A

On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to modify ARC-005 to incorporate the communities of Terra Bella and Ducor into District 5, and to keep the community of Tipton whole. On October 7, 2021, staff presented ARC-005A and the Commission voted to eliminate the map from further consideration.



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to include three majority H-CVAP districts including one above 60%, Terra Bella and Ducor are together with Porterville, Goshen is in District 4 and the City of Tulare is kept whole. Concerns included the City of Porterville was not in one district. On October 7, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.

ARC-006



Commissioner Comments

The Commission found the merits of this map to include good population deviation and two mountain districts. Concerns included no third majority H-CVAP district, the City of Tulare is split, Porterville is split, communities of interest south of Porterville such as Terra Bella and Ducor are not included within the same district as all of Porterville, and the Tulare River Tribal lands are divided between two districts. On October 7, 2021, the Commission voted to eliminate this map from further consideration.

ARC-007

On September 30, 2021, the Commission directed staff to prepare an additional map that split the City of Tulare in the way the Equity Coalition Map had split the city and to keep the surrounding unincorporated communities together as a community of interest. On October 7, 2021, staff presented ARC-007 and the Commission voted to eliminate the map from further consideration.




COM-001B Equity Coalition Map



On September 30, 2021, the Commission voted 7 yes and 4 no to recommend the final Equity Coalition Map (COM-001B) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration. At the following meeting, on October 7, 2021, the Commission voted unanimously to make the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map is in compliance with three districts of H-CVAP majority;
- 2. Takes into consideration the community input that the Commission received regarding the single mountain district;
- 3. Splits the City of Tulare into two different districts, which, while not the preference of all Commissioners, reflects the voices we heard in the community and provides a diversity in maps recommended to the Board of Supervisors;
- 4. Fair distribution of population, to date had the most impressive population deviation;
- 5. Strongest number for H-CVAP majorities through the districts;
- 6. Most inclusive support by community members and most significant public turnout at meetings; and
- 7. Terra Bella, Ducor, and Poplar communities have more in common with City of Porterville than City of Tulare with specific regard to where individuals go to school and shop;


COM-002A1 Wells Map



On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted 8 yes and 3 abstain to recommend the revised Wells Map (COM-002a1) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration, and made the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map includes three H-CVAP majority districts over 51%;
- 2. There is very low population deviation;
- 3. Meets all criteria for community integrity, including that Tulare is not split, West Goshen is in District 4, Terra Bella and Ducor are with Porterville, Woodlake is in District 4, and the middle of Visalia is kept intact;
- 4. Gives the Board a two-mountain-district option; and
- 5. The map shows the best compactness.


COM-003A Verduzco Map



On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted 8 yes 2 no 1abstain to recommend the revised Verduzco Map (COM-003a) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration, and made the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map creates three strong majority H-CVAP districts;
- 2. The shape of District 1 in the City of Visalia is better than other considered maps;
- 3. Meets all criteria for community integrity, including that Tulare is kept whole, Porterville is in District 5, Woodlake is in District 4, Goshen is in District 4, the mountain community is in one district, and Tule River Tribal land is in one district; and
- 4. The map was created by a Commissioner.

COM-005B Kindschuh Map



On October 21, 2021, the Commission voted 9 yes 1 no 1 abstain to recommend the revised Kindschuh Map (COM-005a) to the Board of Supervisors for consideration, and made the following findings associated with its recommendations:

- 1. The map creates three high H-CVAP majority districts;
- 2. Meets all criteria for community integrity, including that Terra Bella and Ducor are together with Porterville, West Goshen is in District 4, Porterville is in District5, Woodlake is in District 4, the mountains are in a single district, Tulare is kept whole, and the Tule River Tribal land is in a single district; and
- 3. The map uses identifiable boundaries; and
- 4. The mapmaker incorporated feedback from the Commission into this final revision.



7. CONCLUSION

This Final Report has been prepared by the Advisory Redistricting Commission and County staff for the consideration of the Board of Supervisors. This report has summarized months of meetings, hours of public testimony, dozens of uniquely complex maps, and valuable contributions from local leaders. This report will serve as a record of the Commission's activities for years to come. It is the hope and intent of the Commission that this Final Report and the extensive information included within its pages will be used to guide the Board's decision-making when considering boundaries for new supervisorial district changes.

The Commission acknowledges that its primary role and, indeed its chief source of influence, is expressed in the small number of maps being recommended to the Board. The Commission also acknowledges that the Board of Supervisors has the sole authority to approve the final supervisorial map, but the Commission would like to communicate to the Board the great attention that has been spent on all of the maps submitted – over 35 in total – and that the few final maps being submitted to the Board reflect the essential requests of the community and the legal requirements contained in the Voting Rights Act and the Fair Maps Act. In that regard, the Commission humbly requests that the Board dedicate its attention to these few maps first as the Board continues to evaluate potential boundary changes.

Importantly, in the spirit of transparency and inclusiveness, the Commission created an interactive process that engaged members of the community from all areas of the County. Each Commissioner exhibited great dedication to this interactive process and volunteered many hours of their time to attend meetings and consider proposed maps. Although not always without disagreement, all Commissioners demonstrated a respect for their colleagues and a mutual attentiveness to the opinions of fellow Commissioners. Tulare County's process has been noted many times as an example of best practices for redistricting and community engagement. At every step of the process, the Commission was thoughtful in their deliberations, considerate of the needs of the public, and allowed for lengthy discussion of this critical issue.

In conclusion, it is with sincere honor and gratitude that the Commission and County staff submit this report to the Board of Supervisors, and, above all, the Commission would like to express sincere gratitude to all of the community members and organizations who participated and contributed to this once-in-a-decade process.



APPENDIX A RECOMMENDED MAP I COM-001b EQUITY COALITION MAP









APPENDIX B RECOMMENDED MAP 2 COM-002a1 WELLS MAP








APPENDIX C RECOMMENDED MAP 3 COM-003b VERDUZCO MAP









APPENDIX D RECOMMENDED MAP 4 COM-005b KINDSCHUH MAP

What is Redistricting?

Every ten years, county supervisorial districts must be redrawn so that each district is substantially equal in population. This process is called redistricting, and is important in ensuring that each supervisor represents approximately the same number of constituents.

In Tulare County, the Board of Supervisors (Board) is responsible for drawing supervisorial districts using U.S. Census data, which is expected to be released around September 30, 2021. For the County of Tulare, the redistricting process must be completed by December 15, 2021.

What Criteria Will Be Used to When Drawing District Lines?

In accordance with the Fair Maps Act (AB 849), supervisorial district boundary and county population criteria include the following in order of priority:

- 1. Population equality shall be based on the total population of residents of the county as determined by the decennial census. State prisoners, whose last known place of residence was in Tulare County as determined by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, shall be added to the Tulare County population.
- 2. Supervisorial district boundaries shall comply with the U.S. Constitution, California Constitution, and the federal Voting Rights Act.
- 3. To the extent practicable, Districts shall be geographically contiguous.
- 4. To the extent practicable, Districts shall respect the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest in a manner that minimizes its division.
- 5. To the extent practicable, Districts shall respect the geographic integrity of a city or census designated place in a manner that minimizes its division
- 6. District boundaries should be easily identifiable and understandable by residents. To the extent practicable, Districts shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers, by streets, or by boundaries of the county.
- 7. To the extent practicable, and where it does not conflict with the preceding criteria, Districts shall be drawn to encourage geographic compactness in such a manner that nearby areas of population are not bypassed in favor of more distant populations.
- 8. The board shall not adopt boundaries for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party.

Why Does Redistricting Matter to Me?

Redistricting determines which neighborhoods and communities are grouped together into a supervisorial district for purposes of electing a Board member. The Board of Supervisors will seek input in selecting the next district map for supervisorial districts. You have an opportunity to share with the Commission and Board of Supervisors how you think district boundaries should be drawn to best represent your community.

How Will the Public Be Notified About Redistricting?

The Board of Supervisors will reach out to local media to publicize the redistricting process, make a good faith effort to notify various community groups about the redistricting process, and provide public hearings and/or workshops in applicable languages if residents submit a request in advance. All redistricting hearings and/or workshops will be noticed to the public in advance, and proposed maps will be posted online for public review and comment before adoption. If you would like to be notified of future meetings, send us an email to add you to our contact list. redistricting@tularecounty.ca.gov

How Do I Submit a Map?

Members of the public may submit draft maps for consideration by the Commission several ways. The most precise way to submit a map is by utilizing the ESRI Software provided by the County found in the following link: https://tularecountyredistricting.esriemcs.com/redistricting/. The software will include guidelines set in the Fair Maps Act. Training videos on how to use the software will be provided at a later date. All other types of map submissions are welcome via email, in person at commission meetings, or mail.

How Do I Get Involved?

The Commission will be holding meetings, public hearings, and workshops to solicit public input on boundary changes. Members of the public are encouraged to provide their input in several ways: in person, email, phone, or zoom. Members of the public may provide public comments during Commission meetings. Members of the public may submit communities of interest for consideration by the Commission.

¿Qué es la redistribución de distritos?

Cada diez años, los distritos de supervisión del condado deben volver a trazarse para que cada distrito sea sustancialmente igual en población. Este proceso se llama redistribución de distritos y es importante para garantizar que cada supervisor represente aproximadamente el mismo número de electores.

En el condado de Tulare, El Consejo de Supervisores (Consejo) es responsable de trazar distritos de supervisión utilizando datos del censo de EE. ¿Qué criterio se utilizará al trazar líneas de distrito?

De acuerdo con la Ley de Mapas Justos (Fair Maps Act AB 849), los límites del distrito de supervisión y los criterios de población del condado incluyen lo siguiente en orden de prioridad:

- La igualdad de población se basará en la población total de residentes del condado según lo determine el censo decenal. Los prisioneros estatales, cuyo último lugar de residencia conocido fue el condado de Tulare, según lo determine el Departamento de Correcciones y Rehabilitación de California, se agregarán a la población del condado de Tulare.
- 2. Los límites de los distritos de supervisión deberán cumplir con la Constitución de los Estados Unidos, la Constitución de California, y la Ley federal de derechos al voto.
- 3. En la medida posible, los distritos serán geográficamente contiguos.
- 4. En la medida posible, los distritos respetarán la integridad geográfica de cualquier vecindario o comunidad local de interés de una manera que minimice su división.
- 5. En la medida de lo posible, los distritos respetarán la integridad geográfica de una ciudad o lugar designado por el censo de una manera que minimice su división.
- 6. Los límites de los distritos deben ser fácilmente identificables y comprensibles para los residentes. En la medida posible, los distritos estarán delimitados por barreras naturales y artificiales, por calles, o por límites del condado.

- 7. En la medida posible, y cuando no entre en conflicto con los criterios anteriores, los distritos se trazarán para fomentar la compacidad geográfica de tal manera que las áreas cercanas de población no se desvíen en favor de poblaciones más distantes.
- 8. El Consejo no adoptará límites con el propósito de favorecer o discriminar a un partido político.

¿Por qué me importa la redistribución de distritos?

La redistribución de distritos determina qué vecindarios y comunidades se agrupan en un distrito de supervisión con el fin de elegir a un miembro del Consejo. El Consejo de Supervisores solicitara información para seleccionar el siguiente mapa de distrito para los distritos supervisores. Usted tiene la oportunidad de compartir con la Comisión y el Consejo de Supervisores cómo cree que se deben trazar los límites del distrito para representar mejor a su comunidad.























RATIONALE

- Contiguous and electorate friendly by connecting the North and South, East and West parts of Tulare County and easily understood by the average voter as you just count the districts from left to right or West to East.
- Proportional sizes except for district 5 which is sparsely populated due to the large Sierra Nevada Mountain Range. Nevertheless, pockets of population centers are clustered so that the actual canvass and campaign geography might be relevant.
- Actually brings our communities together instead of "compartmentalizing" them. The idea of keeping our communities together is what this is from a countywide perspective. "Dividing" our communities is not what this does as any community would still have its fire & poblice, departments, municipalities, school districts and other such public entities which are within those jurisdictions. In fact, using the expression and words "dividing communities of interest" seems to be a red herring that might actually keep us apart in terms of shared resources of the entire county. The county supervisors in the particular districts at hand will have to be sensitive to the societies conomically blighted areas of the North and South and since Visalin is the Seat of our county government, it makes sense that 4/5ths of these districts will intersect and share it.

For instance, Talare, Visalia and Dinuba would have 2 or more supervisors with their concerns and this doubles the focus on their needs and services. The same goes with other municipalities like Porterville. This map attempts to bring us together as a county instead of dividing and separating us into compartments of parochial interests.


- 1. Contiguous and electorate friendly by connecting the North and South, East and West parts of Tulare County and easily understood by the average voter as you just count the districts from left to right or West to East.
- 2. Proportional sizes except for district 5 which is sparsely populated due to the large Sierra Nevada Mountain Range. Nevertheless, pockets of population centers are clustered so that the actual canvass and campaign geography might be relevant.
- 3. Actually brings our communities together instead of "compartmentalizing" them. The idea of keeping our communities together is what this is from a countywide perspective. "Dividing" our communities is not what this does as any community would still have its fire & police, departments, municipalities, school districts and other such public entities which are within those jurisdictions. In fact, using the expression and words "dividing communities of interest" seems to be a red herring that might actually keep us apart in terms of shared resources of the entire county. 
Luna v. County of Kern


- The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) alleged that the supervisorial district boundaries drawn by the Kern County Board of Supervisors in 2011 were drawn in violation of the U.S. Voting Rights Act by splitting similar communities of Latino voters in northwest Kern County into two different supervisors' districts.
- A U.S. District Court upheld the allegation that "Latino voters in Kern County have been deprived of an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice, in violation of § 2 of the [Federal] Voting Rights Act."
- Parties settled the suit in March 2018 by redrawing supervisorial district lines to create a second Latino-majority district. The County also paid \$5 million in attorneys' fees and costs for both sides.


















RATIONALE

- 1. Contiguous and electorate friendly by connecting the North and South, East and West parts of Tulare County and easily understood by the average voter as you just count the districts from left to right or West to East.
- Proportional sizes except for district 5 which is sparsely populated due to the large Sierra Nevada Mountain Range. Nevertheless, pockets of population centers are clustered so that the actual canvass and campaign geography might be relevant.
- 3. Actually brings our communities together instead of "compartmentalizing" them. The idea of keeping our communities together is what this is from a countywide perspective. "Dividing" our communities is not what this does as any community would still have its fire & police, departments, municipalities, school districts and other such public entities which are within those jurisdictions. In fact, using the expression and words "dividing communities of interest" seems to be a red herring that might actually keep us apart in terms of shared resources of the entire county. The county supervisors in the particular districts at hand will have to be sensitive to the socioeconomically blighted areas of the North and South and since Visalia is the Seat of our county government, it makes sense that 4/5ths of these districts will intersect and share it.
- 4. Each district has approximately 88,436 people. The % deviation has been keep to as low as 0.0 for all of them. They all have Hispanic majorities per our county census. It is likely that 2-3 will have Hispanic CVAP majorities.
- 5. As county supervisors, their awareness and political concerns should cover the entire county and that is what this redistricting attempts to do. It connects the communities of interest instead of compartmentalizing them. For instance, Tulare, Visalia and Dinuba would have 2 or more supervisors with their concerns and this doubles the focus on their needs and services. The same goes with other municipalities like Porterville. This map attempts to bring us together as a county instead of dividing and separating us into compartments of parochial interests.

Kern County Case

Luna v. County of Kern

- The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) alleged that the supervisorial district boundaries drawn by the Kern County Board of Supervisors in 2011 were drawn in violation of the U.S. Voting Rights Act by splitting similar communities of Latino voters in northwest Kern County into two different supervisors' districts.
- A U.S. District Court upheld the allegation that "Latino voters in Kern County have been deprived of an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice, in violation of § 2 of the [Federal] Voting Rights Act."
- Parties settled the suit in March 2018 by redrawing supervisorial district lines to create a second Latino-majority district. The County also paid \$5 million in attorneys' fees and costs for both sides.

Communities of Interest

The State constitution defines a community of interest as a contiguous population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

- 2. Where is your community located geographically?
- 3. Is your shared interest within the policy jurisdiction of Tulare County?























RATIONALE

- 1. Contiguous and electorate friendly by connecting the North and South, East and West parts of Tulare County and easily understood by the average voter as you just count the districts from left to right or West to East.
- Proportional sizes except for district 5 which is sparsely populated due to the large Sierra Nevada Mountain Range. Nevertheless, pockets of population centers are clustered so that the actual canvass and campaign geography might be relevant.
- 3. Actually brings our communities together instead of "compartmentalizing" them. The idea of keeping our communities together is what this is from a countywide perspective. "Dividing" our communities is not what this does as any community would still have its fire & police, departments, municipalities, school districts and other such public entities which are within those jurisdictions. In fact, using the expression and words "dividing communities of interest" seems to be a red herring that might actually keep us apart in terms of shared resources of the entire county. The county supervisors in the particular districts at hand will have to be sensitive to the socioeconomically blighted areas of the North and South and since Visalia is the Seat of our county government, it makes sense that 4/5ths of these districts will intersect and share it.
- 4. Each district has approximately 88,436 people. The % deviation has been keep to as low as 0.0 for all of them. They all have Hispanic majorities per our county census. It is likely that 2-3 will have Hispanic CVAP majorities.
- 5. As county supervisors, their awareness and political concerns should cover the entire county and that is what this redistricting attempts to do. It connects the communities of interest instead of compartmentalizing them. For instance, Tulare, Visalia and Dinuba would have 2 or more supervisors with their concerns and this doubles the focus on their needs and services. The same goes with other municipalities like Porterville. This map attempts to bring us together as a county instead of dividing and separating us into compartments of parochial interests.

Kern County Case

Luna v. County of Kern

- The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund (MALDEF) alleged that the supervisorial district boundaries drawn by the Kern County Board of Supervisors in 2011 were drawn in violation of the U.S. Voting Rights Act by splitting similar communities of Latino voters in northwest Kern County into two different supervisors' districts.
- A U.S. District Court upheld the allegation that "Latino voters in Kern County have been deprived of an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice, in violation of § 2 of the [Federal] Voting Rights Act."
- Parties settled the suit in March 2018 by redrawing supervisorial district lines to create a second Latino-majority district. The County also paid \$5 million in attorneys' fees and costs for both sides.

Communities of Interest

The State constitution defines a community of interest as a contiguous population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.























RATIONALE

- 1. Contiguous and electorate friendly by connecting the North and South, East and West parts of Tulare County and easily understood by the average voter as you just count the districts from left to right or West to East.
- Proportional sizes except for district 5 which is sparsely populated due to the large Sierra Nevada Mountain Range. Nevertheless, pockets of population centers are clustered so that the actual canvass and campaign geography might be relevant.
- 3. Actually brings our communities together instead of "compartmentalizing" them. The idea of keeping our communities together is what this is from a countywide perspective. "Dividing" our communities is not what this does as any community would still have its fire & police, departments, municipalities, school districts and other such public entities which are within those jurisdictions. In fact, using the expression and words "dividing communities of interest" seems to be a red herring that might actually keep us apart in terms of shared resources of the entire county. The county supervisors in the particular districts at hand will have to be sensitive to the socioeconomically blighted areas of the North and South and since Visalia is the Seat of our county government, it makes sense that 4/5ths of these districts will intersect and share it.
- 4. Each district has approximately 88,436 people. The % deviation has been keep to as low as 0.0 for all of them. They all have Hispanic majorities per our county census. It is likely that 2-3 will have Hispanic CVAP majorities.
- 5. As county supervisors, their awareness and political concerns should cover the entire county and that is what this redistricting attempts to do. It connects the communities of interest instead of compartmentalizing them. For instance, Tulare, Visalia and Dinuba would have 2 or more supervisors with their concerns and this doubles the focus on their needs and services. The same goes with other municipalities like Porterville. This map attempts to bring us together as a county instead of dividing and separating us into compartments of parochial interests.

Map Formats

The Commission will consider community maps in the following formats:

- 1. Electronic maps (created with GIS or other map-drawing software)
- 2. Hand-drawn maps
- 3. A written description of proposed boundaries

What Information to Include?

To the extent practicable, maps should include the following information:

- 1. Your name and contact information. Contact information will be used for notification purposes only.
- 2. Your map's name. Staff will also assign your map a number for tracking purposes.
- 3. Total population data for each district (Redistricting Criteria #1).
- 4. Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP) data for each district (Redistricting Criteria #2).
- 5. Any other documentation or rationale used in developing your map.

How to Submit a Map?



Through County Redistricting Software. If you create a map using the County's Redistricting Software, you may submit that map to the commission using the "Submit Plan" button.
